

My research interests include Early Childhood Education as well as Educational Management. I done my PhD in Educational Management at UNISA.

Tell us a bit about your role at UODL/NWU?

As the Academic Manager for the Faculty of Education I manage all communication and information provided by the Faculty for the distance programmes and students. This includes collaboration with an Executive Dean, Deputy Dean, five Directors and nine programme leaders at the Potchefstroom Campus to serve approximately 10 000 students in the Faculty of Education representing more than 11 different distance programmes. I currently work closely with the SALA staff and understand the operations and procedures including applications and admissions services, registrations, student record-keeping processes and the logistical administrative support. I compile the timetable for the paper-based programmes, information booklets and correspondence to students and lecturers. In my role, I have gained mature knowledge of all functional areas within the student administration domain at UODL. I manage the biggest component of distance programmes offered at NWU. I also work closely with the director and staff of UODL, collaborate with the e-Learning division, study centre coordinator, as well as the project and short-learning programme management. Much effort is placed on adhering to quality management to ensure that the quality processes of the UODL are in place and monitored.

Three words that best describe you?

I maintain a high level of integrity and trustworthiness with a strong sense of determination.

What are you passionate about?

I am results-driven and my strong problem solving, analytical and abstract reasoning skills equip me to be passionate about serving our distance students on all levels of need.

My first teaching post was at Outeniqua High School in George. There I taught Mathematics and where I later became the Guidance counsellor.

In 1994 I went to Mozambique as a missionary. First in Maputo, as a Maths teacher, (teaching in English), and later in Vila Ulónguè (about 2000km north of Potchefstroom), as a lecturer in Educational Psychology at a Teacher's Training College.

After two years I became a lecturer in Pastoral Counselling at a Theological Seminary (teaching in Portuguese). Whether I speak Afrikaans, English or Portuguese, the Upington accent always comes through...(LOL)

What makes Wendy so special is her faith and bringing our family closer to the worship of the Almighty God. She has a great ability to lift us up when we stress and are down.






Moodiline Rutherford: Office of the SALA Director

Indeed, she was a MBOKOTO. I wish that her spirit can be in every woman to fight challenges faced by women of today.




Simphiwe Moleko e-Learning

Sometimes distance learning is harder because you miss the support and interaction of your peers, so choose discipline and focus. Do what you love and reach out for help when needed.
