2022: New year - greater possibilities


Following a turbulent 2020, a volatile 2021, we have planned for and anticipate that 2022 will be a more promising year for us all.

Here are reflections from the various divisions:

STARTING OVER

More magic is about to be born!

2022 marks the beginning of a new era. The nomenclature of the unit has been aligned towards the Teaching and Learning mission and vision for its distance learning students. We are proud to announce, the official name as Unit for Distance Learning – Teaching &Learning. A process leading to this change is described below.

In late 2019, the NWU's UMC had approved the setting up of a structure to better deal with the teaching-learning needs of the distance education students.

In the course of 2020 this structure had been further developed and optimised at no additional costs to the University. Given the changed form as well as purpose of the new Unit it made sense to consult with staff members about an identity shift that signalled more clearly the purpose of the Unit as dedicated to teaching-learning support.

In 2021 a process of consulting the ODL (i.e. both SALA and T-L) leadership had been initiated by the Director, also in consultation with the Director UODL SALA, the Deputy Registrar as well as the DVC T&L.

Various suggestions had been motivated to better capture the mandate and the purpose of the UODL in terms of providing teaching-learning support to academics and faculties, as contrasted with the UODL SALA in which admissions, registrations, examinations organisation and related academic records, were managed. In particular the focus was on the nature of teaching-learning support offered to distance education students in faculties and academics.

This functionality in terms of curriculum related support is quite unlike that of the SALA focus in distance education on admissions, registrations, and marks related processes.

Furthermore, the former Unit's emphasis on "open" distance education had to be revisited alongside the University's commitment to offer aligned contact and distance programmes in which there would similarly be an aligned admissions and registration process. In light of the above, a staff survey had also been conducted, open to both SALA and UODL TL colleagues, with a view of exploring other naming possibilities and their feelings about the need for a name change. The results yielded a majority vote for UDL T&L which was subsequently approved by the University Management Committee in late 2021.



THOUGHTS BY THE DEPUTY VICE-CHANCELLOR FOR TEACHING & LEARNING, PROFESSOR ROBERT BALFOUR

When asked about the change, Professor Robert Balfour, has the following to say: "The long and illustrious history of the UODL at the NWU has laid the foundation for its latest iteration in which the Unit's mandate to provide teaching-learning support becomes more focused and specialised. This aligns with University strategy to increase portfolio and range of programmes offered by Faculties (with all Faculties now offering a selection of programmes in distance education) some of which are aligned to contact programmes and thus also to the University's processes as regards to recruitment, selection, admissions and registrations. Facultybased support of students as well as staff becomes therefore the mandate of the new UDL-TL.

Nationally we have also seen a changing appetite from government in terms of funded programmes, away from teacher education. towards other areas specialisation and scarce skills (like IT, cyber-security, labour practice and law and so on) to which the University had had to respond. The impact of this emphasis-change is felt by the NWU in terms of its distance enrolments which must grow and the need to secure new sources of funding for programmes in niche areas through corporate government sources."





"Speaking Stats": Sharing results


A Survey was commissioned which allowed all UODL (SALA & T&L) staff, an opportunity to have their voices heard; suggestions were then considered and discussed. This graphical representation displays the outcomes of the staff survey that was conducted.

It was noted that 43.2% voted in favour for the name change to reflect Unit for Distance Learning-Teaching and Learning (UDL-T&L). This was the tallied votes from the sections that Dr J Fransman, the Director oversees.

The option with the majority vote for the UODL-SALA under the directorship of Dr A.Kok, was the Unit for Distance Learning-SALA (UDL-SALA). The statistics gathered suggest that the alternate options did not attract a substantial vote. The graph below reflects the winning vote yields a 56.8% in favour of UDL-SALA.



Bursary students who have successfully obtained Grade R Diploma in Teaching qualification from Northern Cape and Gauteng provinces have been afforded the opportunity to articulate into BEd Degree (Foundation Phase). This is in line with our T&L's mission statement to support the students so that they can progressively become self-directed and lifelong learners. Efforts to support bursary students are starting to bear fruits, retention and throughput rates are sure to improve.

E-LEARNING


The e-Learning Team 'hit the ground running' in January 2022 as there was much planning and processes to implement in preparation for our online programmes and live broadcast sessions. Further, the integration of Panopto (video capture, management and sharing platform) with the learner management system, eFundi and Microsoft Teams, the unit had to ensure that all UDL:T&L end-users are effectively trained on the use of same.



Online Programmes


With the integration of Panopto with eFundi and Microsoft Teams, lecturers can now seamlessly record their lectures within the eFundi platform. This further allows for them to easily edit and then share their recorded lectures with their students. When integrating Panopto with MS Teams, connect sessions with their students can be recorded and automatically sent to the Panopto platform for ease of access, editing and sharing. This essentially allows for lecturers to work in one space and various processes are now streamlined.

With the kind assistance from NWU's Electronic Services and AE Solutions, e-Learning managed to secure a 'touch screen', at no cost, for purposes of testing.

e-Learning is exploring alternative technological solutions for its multimedia venues and this will no doubt aid in the decision-making.

PROJECTS

Student Registrations

The e-Learning team developed an online platform for the uploading of registration documents and with a bit of automation, letters to students were automatically generated and the database could be accessed by registration and the call centre staff simultaneously. This assisted greatly with streamlining administrative processes.

Further, an information platform was developed that greatly assisted students to follow processes involved in successfully registering for the academic year. e-Learning worked closely with the application and registration division.

Strategic Funding: Skills Development - UDL Staff

We are now in our second year of this project and our staff continue to derive benefit from these sessions. The units latest session focused on how our applications and registrations division makes use of the VSS system (application status, student records, registration statistics and finance). The session was facilitated by Mrs Keshni Scholtz. Positive feedback was received from participants who attended the session. e-Learning is now focused on developing advanced training content on the use of technological platforms that the UDL staff use on a regular basis.

Namibia: New Office

The UDL's office based in Windhoek is in process of moving to new offices. Ms Zanobia Kanjee from the e-Learning division is overseeing this project which includes ICT interventions. She continues to connect with various service providers and staff based in Windhoek. The new offices will allow for additional space and a section where students can access online resources. It is hoped that staff will be able to move to their new office by the end of March.














Designated Web Page for Namibia Students
